Belgian Roadside Chapel Tours

Roadside chapels were built by Belgian settlers in the southern Door Peninsula starting in the mid 1800's. Before the settlers could build churches for an entire congregation, devout settlers built their own small chapels and shared them with travelers. The chapels are found throughout the Belgian settlement, a 150 square mile area covering parts of Door, Kewaunee and Brown counties.

Old World Tradition Following a tradition from the Ardennes region of Belgium and often named for patron saints, descendants of the settlers continue to build and care for these sacred spaces. Many remain open to travelers today.

A local historian from the Belgian Heritage Center will provide a guided narration for your tour group. We will visit chapels built by the early settlers as well as those built in modern times. You will hear about the challenges faced by the settlers and the fascinating stories behind each of the votive chapels.

Tour Highlights We will visit 4-8 Roadside Chapels. Tours include a stop at the Belgian community's most important chapel – the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help – built on the site where the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to a young Belgian woman in 1859. Fondly known as simply as "the Chapel" in the local community, your group will hear the remarkable history of this site and stroll the grounds of the only Marian apparition in North America deemed worthy of belief by the Catholic church.

- Traditional Belgian lunch featuring booyah, trippe (pork/cabbage sausage), jutt (fried cabbage) and Belgian pie
