CELEBRATING 170 YEARS...

1853-2023



Continuing in our 2023 series commemorating the 170th anniversary of the arrival of the first group of Belgian settlers to northeastern Wisconsin, we share the stories of the Haulotte and Jossart families.

STANISLAS & MARIE-VICTOIRE (COLON)

HAULOTTE - Stanislas Joseph (Joseph) Haulotte and his wife, Marie-Victoire Colon (both 28) traveled aboard the Quinnebaug in 1853 from Bonlez, Belgium along with their four oldest children; Eugenie (Jane)(8), Edouard (Edward)(6), Clemence(4) and Leon(1). Per his obituary in the Green Bay Press Gazette on April 30, 1872, Joseph's passing is described as the death of the first Belgian settler in Brown County. The obituary describes the family settling in the Champion area where they built huts covered with leaves and bark to shelter themselves for several months until they learned to build log houses and manufacture shaved shingles. By 1859, the growing family (eight more children) had moved to the Town of Humboldt and Joseph began to manage a sawmill. The Great Fire of 1871, however, would destroy his mill, house, cattle and machinery, leaving the family with but two horses. The obituary goes on to describe Joseph as very discouraged for about a week after the fire but upon receiving insurance money, he was able to rebuild the sawmill and had it in fine working order at the time of his demise. Descendants describe his passing because of smoke inhalation during the fire. At the time of his death, Joseph was serving as the town chairman for the Town of Humboldt and was well respected. Large numbers of townspeople accompanied the family to his burial in the Robinsonville Presbyterian cemetery.

JEAN JOSEPH JOSSART - Jean Joseph Jossart was born in Longueville, Brabant, Belgium on December 17, 1829, the son of Pierre Joseph Jossart and Marie Therese Geuninck. Jean Joseph had four sisters and two brothers. His mother, Marie Therese, died in 1834 when he was only five years old. His father would then pass in 1843 when Jean Joseph was then 14 years old. By 1853, when Jean Joseph sailed on the Quinnebaug at the age of 24, he was the only surviving member of his immediate family. Upon arrival in the Belgian settlement area, Jean Joseph purchased 40 acres of government land in the SW quarter of the NE quarter of Section 3 in the Town of Green Bay. In 1855, he married Gregorienne Vincent, daughter of Jean Baptiste Vincent and Marie Therese Remy from Grez-Doiceau. The Vincent family came to Wisconsin in 1854. The Jossarts would have eight children, seven sons and one daughter. Three sons were born prior to Jean Joseph's service in the Civil War from November 1862 to September 1863 in the 34th infantry. Upon returning from the war, Jean Joseph would farm on the homestead until he passed in 1896. The land was then sold to the Louis and Justine Gomand family; today it is part of the DeChamps farm. "Aux Premiers Belges" Monument in Champion

How did this monument in Champion come to be? In a ceremony at Champion on Saturday, July 6, 1985, a monument honoring descendants of the first Belgian immigrants to northeastern Wisconsin was dedicated. Master of Ceremonies, Rev. Samuel Jadin, Rev. Jean Ducat (delegate of the mayor of Grez-Doiceau, Belgium) and Robert Ciparisse, member of the Wallonie-Wisconsin Society (Belgium's equivalent of the Peninsula Belgian American Club) participated in the presenting of the monument to the community. The monument was accepted by Harry Chaudoir, President of the Peninsula Belgian-American Club, Sanford DuMoulin, Chairman of the Town of Red River and Cecil Depeau, Chairman of the Town of Green Bay. In addition to Rev. Jadin, Rev. Robert Hannon, Pastor of the Robinsonville Presbyterian Church (and descendant of the Hannon first family) gave the invocation and Rev. Francis Kerscher, Pastor of St. Joseph's Church gave the final blessing. There was a laying of the wreath by Grez-Doiceau descendants and the playing of the Star Spangled Banner and La Brabanconne (national anthem of Belgium). Alfred Vandertie sang "La Bia Bouquet", the anthem of Wallonie.



The monument contains a depiction of Sint Georges (*Flemish spelling*) who the inhabitants of Grez Doiceau and Sint Joris Weert have chosen as their protector for more than 1,000 years. Sint George is carrying a banner and riding a horse. He is a scout, holding the banner and showing the way. The horse is galloping, going forward without stopping with perseverance, courage, and tenacity. All qualities found in the first Belgian Settlers. The monument was presented in honor of the ongoing friendship and common history between the inhabitants of the Belgian homeland and the Belgian settlement communities. The monument stands today in front of the Town of Green Bay town hall (formerly Champion School). We encourage you to visit the Champion area to see the monument and the home of the first Belgian settlement in 1853.

Monthly Photo Contest

BHC has received many wonderful photos in our monthly contest. Our favorites are those that come with a unique story. Phyllis Haevers was the May winner with the photo below of Haevers Millinery Story in Green Bay. She shared this additional information about the two Belgian sisters who owned the store.

Angeline (Haevers) Hodek 1883-1967 & Albertine (Haevers) Duerr 1882-1963

Angeline attended a millinery school in Chicago after high school. Even before attending millinery school, Angeline would sometimes make hats for herself and her sisters. Her sister Agnes told her daughter Ruby that when the Haevers girls wore Angeline's elaborate hats to country dances, the boys were afraid to ask the girls to dance because the hats were so fancy. Later, her father Ferdinand provided the capital to start the millinery store with her sister Albertine.

The Haevers Millinery store was first located at 309 Main in Green Bay and reopened two years later at 424 Main Street. Many people thought that two "old maids" ran the store, not realizing that there were many children that visited in the back of the store. Granddaughter Helene remembers a feather bed in back of a stack of hatboxes that various family members used for naps during the day. The women spoke Flemish so the children couldn't understand when "adult secrets" were being told. The hat shop closed when both sisters were hospitalized in 1962. Their good humor stayed with them even in sickness, for the sign on the door read "Closed for repairs".



The store had the first hemstitching machine in the Green Bay area. Women were amazed at the ability of the machine to do so quickly what normally took many hours of work. The sisters frequently let friends bring pillow cases and tablecloths to the store to decorate and finish. When they closed the hat shop, the machine was donated to the Ladies of Charity, an order of nuns that used it to help support their mission of helping unwed mothers. The millinery store was torn down when the mall in downtown Green Bay was built.

Chaudoir "planted" two dozen prairie jackrabbits in the Brussels area about 15 years before and he maintained that this was the start of successful prairie jackrabbit hunting. Chaudoir just happened to drop in at the Kashik Meat Market when members of the Algoma Boat club brought in about seven of the "jacks."

Belgian Harvest Festival at National Shrine of Our Lady of Champion



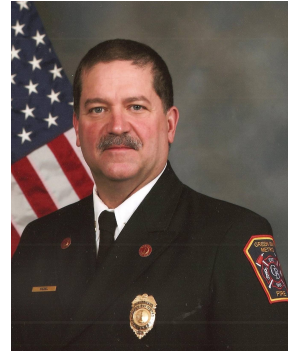

Door County Land Trust Embraces Belgian Accent for Event

The Door County Land Trust (DCLT) will hold its Annual Gathering at the Belgian Heritage Center on Friday, August 25 from 2:00 to 5:00. The event will begin with a social, art raffle and music with picnic and dessert buffets opening at 3:30. The program will begin at 4:00.

Those registering for the DCLT Annual Gathering are excited to explore a foreign culture that is firmly rooted in Southern Door. Although the location is considered familiar to DCLT members, what lies behind the doors of the Belgian Heritage Center will be eye-opening for many. The event will have a strong Belgian influence with music by the Caravan Gypsy Swing Ensemble—complete with an accordion; décor of red, yellow, and black; and tours of the museum. The event is open to the public and tickets may be purchased online at www.DoorCountyLandTrust.org/gathering.

School/Convent Accessibility Project – Help Us Welcome All Visitors

The school/convent on BHC’s campus has a storied history. Built in 1894, with construction overseen by Fr. Bernard Pennings (*later Abbot Pennings*), it was paid for by parishioners who contributed bags of grain according to their means. The Peninsula Belgian American Club operated it as a clubhouse from 1965 until 2018 when it was transferred to BHC. The first floor has been partially restored to a 1900 era, new windows were installed and various maintenance items have been addressed. Visitors were welcomed starting in May 2021. However, the building is only accessible to those able to walk up several steps.



BHC worked with Legacy Architecture of Sheboygan to develop a solution. It was important to avoid the typical approach of a constructed ramp and railings as such a structure was not historically a feature of the building. Instead, a concrete walk on a graded ramp will lead to the classroom entrance. The existing double door will be modified for ease of entry while maintaining the appearance of the original door. Volunteers will move the votive chapel of St. Roche to be easily accessible from the paved walk.



The estimated cost is \$43,700. We raised \$28,500 thanks to the Maihaugen Foundation, Clifford and Clara Herlache Heritage Fund of Door County Community Foundation, the Peninsula Belgian-American Club, BHC and an anonymous donor. BHC is hoping to start this work this fall so everyone can access the building when we reopen in May 2024. We need to raise the remaining funds by November 1 so the work can be contracted.

Can you help us welcome everyone to this historic building? Donors contributing \$600 or more will be recognized with a plaque installed at the schoolhouse entrance.
